





# Stanislas

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Today, Nancy is one of France's largest cities, yet its history is relatively recent - going back only ten centuries. The city was established in the 11th century by Gerard the Wonderful, Duke of Lorraine, on a route running through the Meurthe Valley, to protect his lands in that feudal period. Vestiges from the Middle Ages are rare, however.

It was not until the 16th century that the ducal city really started to flourish.

The Palace of the Dukes, the Château de Fléville, elegant town houses and the beautiful fortified portals are all magnificent examples of Renaissance architecture.

Adjacent to the old town (Ville Vieille), a modern new town (Ville Neuve) was built to house a growing population. The fortifications, ultra-modern for their time, were the talk of Europe!

In the 18th century, Stanislaw Leszczynski achieved a feat of town planning, uniting the old and the new towns with an ensemble of royal buildings of which Place Stanislas (formerly Place Royale) was the centrepiece. Installed by his son-in-law Louis XV, Stanislaw's role was to prepare the reversion of the duchy to the kingdom of France on his death in 1766. The ensemble, recognised by UNESCO in 1983, is the pride of the city's inhabitants and admired by visitors from the world over.

After the Franco-Prussian war in 1870, the loss of Alsace-Moselle made Nancy, which remained French, a border city. An influx of population and an economic boom brought about a new kind of renaissance; the city was modernised and, most importantly, the "Ecole de Nancy" was born. The city became a hub of artistic and technical creativity, in which art and industry combined thanks to the genius of Émile Gallé, Louis Majorelle, Jacques Gruber and other industrial artists who contributed to the worldwide reputation Nancy still has to this day.

Creativeness and ingeniousness are identifying features of our region. Today, Greater Nancy numbers no fewer than 55,000 students, including many from abroad, attracted by our internationally renowned research laboratories. And a technological centre devoted to science and medicine brings together 300 establishments, 2,000 researchers and teachers, as well as major French research institutes.

Innovative, creative, dynamic, cultural, influential and diverse. Nancy is a city in continual renewal. Today, the opening of Nancy Thermal in 2023 is yet further proof of this. The secret and little known Greater Nancy region welcomes you with open arms. Come and discover its many charms.

# **UNESCO ENSEMBLE**



Place Stanislas is one of the most beautiful squares in the world and gives Nancy its name as 'the city with the golden gates'. The square, together with Place de la Carrière, Place d'Alliance and the triumphal arch, form a monumental 18th-century ensemble that has been inscribed in the UNESCO world heritage list in 1983. In 2023 Nancy celebrates the 40th anniversary of this inscription with an exciting

programme of events.



### PLACE STANISLAS

Commissioned by Stanislaw in honour of his son-in-law, Louis XV, this square in the heart of Nancy is the jewel inthe city's crown! Did you know it measures 106 by 124 metres? The City Hall takes up the whole of the southern side. The four pavilions house the Lorraine Opera and the Fine Arts Museum. The classical architecture is enhanced by Jean Lamour's gilded wrought-iron gates and the rococo fountains. See if you can find all the symbols of royalty featured on the gates or have fun deciphering the expressions of the 100 mascarons that adorn the different buildings. To fully take in the beauty of this royal ensemble, take a break at one of the pavement cafes or sit down for a while

on one of the benches around

the edge of the square.

### PLACE DE LA CARRIÈRE AND THE PALAIS DU GOUVERNEMENT

Place de la Carrière, which extends from Place Stanislas. was already a square in medieval times, part of the old town (Ville Vieille), and was used for horse training and tournaments. It was here that the Palais du Gouvernement was

built in the 18th century, to house the intendant, the representative of the French crown. The facades were all remodelled by Stanislaw's architect Emmanuel Héré, who also built the elegant town houses on the corners. Place Carrière forms the entrance to the old town and leads towards the Palace of the Dukes of Lorraine.

### THE TRIUMPHAL ARCH

From Place Stanislas you can look up at the winged allegory of Renown, blowing her trumpet. Below her, the portrait of Louis XV, a reminder of the king to whom this whole architectural ensemble is dedicated. Do you know what the Latin inscription means? 'Terror of his enemies, craftsman of treaties, glory and love of his people'!

### PLACE D'ALLIANCE

The third of the UNESCOlisted squares, also the smallest and the most discreet, was built on the site of the Duke of Lorraine's former kitchen garden. It features an unusual fountain, known as the 'three old men'. Architect Emmanuel Héré's town house is on this square too; and still has its original lanterns. Can you find it?




# **ART NOUVEAU**

Nancy, the cradle of Art nouveau!
In 1871 the local economy received a significant boost with the arrival of a prosperous new population bringing capital, businesses and expertise. The conditions were ripe for the emergence of a new, modern style, centred around artists, industrialists and patrons such as Émile Gallé and Eugène Corbin.

In 1901, these artists and industrialists formed the Provincial Alliance of the Industries of Art, which became known as the "Ecole de Nancy". They promoted collaboration between different fields,

and encouraged research and innovation, and the training of skilled workers. Their enlightened social policy advocated 'Art for everyone, and art in everything'.





Nancy celebrates Art Nouveau every year on 10 June, World Art Nouveau Day.




SPOTLIGHT ON
THE VILLA MAJORELLE

### NANCY CITIPASS

This beautiful threestorev house, built in 1901 for Louis Majorelle and his family, features several semi-circular windows as well as floral motifs covering the exterior. The wroughtiron decorative elements were made by Majorelle himself, as were the interior furnishings, wood panelling and staircase. He set up his studio on the third floor. Two Parisian artists were involved in its creation: the architect Henri Sauvage, just 25 vears old at the time, and the ceramist Alexandre Biaot. The stained-alass windows came from the Nancy workshop of Jacques Gruber.

Art Nouveau was strongly influenced by the natural world and in particular floral elements.

Émile Gallé was a trained botanist and founding father of the "Ecole de Nancy". He drew much of his inspiration from nature, in particular the flora of the Lorraine region.

Such motifs are found everywhere; in architecture, furniture and glassware. Louis Majorelle carved the words 'Ma racine est au fond des bois' (My roots are in the depths of the woods) on the door of the Gallé workshops (it's now displayed in the garden of the "Ecole de Nancy" Museum).

Today Nancy's Art nouveau heritage is comprised of some fifty buildings in different parts of the city, as well as **two art** collections housed in two museums:

- The Daum collection at the Fine Arts Museum
- The collection of the Ecole de Nancy Museum; the only museum in the world dedicated solely to Art nouveau.

# OR ART DECO

People often mix these up, but in fact they are two different styles. Art deco, which emerged just before the First World War, is a development of Art nouveau. While still inspired by nature, Art Deco abandoned the curved forms of Art nouveau in favour of a return to more stylised, geometrical forms.

# **RENAISSANCE**

Following the Battle of Nancy in 1477, which opposed the troops of the Dukes of Lorraine and of Burgundy, Nancy came to reflect the new ducal power. The city gradually increased in size and in attractiveness, its inhabitants and visitors alike benefiting from a rich heritage.

Traces of the Renaissance can be seen across the city and in the surrounding area, and in a number of emblematic sites in particular. You'll find a number of commemorative markers on the pavements that were made in 2013. indicating the Renaissance heritage. Here are a few examples of symbolic sites from this era:



# NUMEROUS ELEGANT TOWN HOUSES

including the Hôtel d'Haussonville and the Hôtel de Lillebonne.

### THE CHÂTEAU DE FLÉVILLE

one of the architectural gems of Greater Nancy, a blend of medieval and Renaissance styles. The prestigious interior features Renaissance wood panelling, a collection of 18th-century tapestries, the hall of the coats of arms of the Dukes of Lorraine, and the royal apartments dedicated to Stanislaw. The garden, awarded the French 'remarkable garden' label, houses an 18th-century orangery decorated with a beautiful, recently restored 17th-century trompe l'oeil.

# THE PALACE OF THE DUKES OF LORRAINE

which houses the Lorraine Museum. The Museum is being renovated and is due to reopen in 2029. The Franciscan Church (Église des Cordeliers) remains open, free of charge, during the renovation work.

# THE CREATION OF THE NEW TOWN (VILLE NEUVE)

adjoining the old town (Ville Vieille) and the UNESCO ensemble. It was created by Duke Charles III and was an urban model.



### **OUR TOP TIP**

The Château de Fléville is a great place for a day out with the kids.

As well as being able to dress up as knights or princesses, children are given an activities booklet so they can explore the Château and learn about its history in a fun way.

Museums bring together culture, local history and heritage. There are seven museums and one art gallery in the Greater Nancy area, each devoted to a specific theme. Some of their art collections are unrivalled in France.

Entrance is free of charge on the first Sunday of each month and free for under 26-year-olds, students and holders of the Nancy CityPass.



### FINE ARTS MUSEUM

Situated on Place Stanislas, the museum opens onto a room dedicated to designer and architect Jean Prouvé. Discover a panorama of European art from the 14th century to the present day, including works by Rubens, Caravaggio and Delacroix. The museum is also proud to feature the work of artists from Lorraine such as Jacques Callot, Jacques Bellange, Claude Fellée and Émile Friant.

Absolutely not to be missed: the Daum collection: 300 pieces created by the master glassmakers of Nancy, showcased in a striking display.

Price: €7, €10 to include entry to exhibitions. Open Wednesdays to Mondays.

# OF THE DUKES OF LORRAINE

The Franciscan Church (Église des Cordeliers) is the only part of this museum complex open during the renovation work, due to be completed by 2029. In the meantime, a permanent exhibition recounts the history of the duchy of Lorraine. Between the 15th and the 18th century, the church housed the tombs of the Dukes of Lorraine. The monumental funerary recess of Duke René II and the effigy of his spouse Philippa of Guelders are particularly noteworthy.

Entry free of charge. Open Tuesdays to Sundays.

### THE "ECOLE DE NANCY" MUSEUM

Housed in a magnificent villa, the museum is entirely devoted to Art nouveau. It recreates the interior of a 1900 villa and features some of the finest examples of work by Émile Gallé, Louis Majorelle, Eugène Vallin and Jacques Gruber (furniture, glassware, stained glass, leatherwork and ceramics).

# CHATEAU DE MONTAIGU AND ITS PARK LANEUVEVILLE-DEVANT-NANCY AND JARVILLELA-MALGRANGE

The former home of the collector Edouard Salin (1889-1970), this lovely manor house features collections that testify to the tastes of an enlightened enthusiast: objets d'art, 18th to early 20th century furniture, decorative arts and archaeology. The park is filled with plant varieties typical of 19th century gardens and is open to all. The Féru des sciences is on the grounds of the château.

Price: €5.80, open on week-ends from april to september

### THE AQUARIUM

The Aquarium in Nancy features 300 aquatic species housed in 57 tanks.

Visitors, young and old alike, will also enjoy discovering the zoological gallery's collection of more than 450, shells, insects, fossils and stuffed animals. The information panels (in French and English) provide scientific explanations with a touch of humour and the Aquarium also organises fun and interactive temporary exhibitions.

Price: €5.80. Open Tuesdays to Sundays.



### **GALERIE POIREL**

A vast contemporary art and design gallery in one of Nancy's emblematic 19th-century buildings. The Poirel's programme of exhibitions focuses on contemporary art, with a strong design element. It is only open to the public during exhibitions.

Price: varies according to exhibitions.



### JEAN-MARIE PELT BOTANICAL GARDENS

In this 'living museum' of the plant world, one of the largest botanical gardens in Europe, 12,000 unusual, extraordinary, rare or threatened species are cultivated with skill and love in 35 hectares of parkland and 2,500 m² of tropical greenhouses. And as an added extra – a stunning view of the Greater Nancy area.

Price: €5.80 for the tropical greenhouses. No charge for the gardens. Open every day.

### LE FÉRU DES SCIENCES MUSEUM


Families are invited to explore the world of science at Le Féru des Sciences (formerly the Museum of the History of Iron), set in the magnificent grounds of the Château de Montaigu. The science and cultural centre features a hands-on experimentation area, a hanging oasis, the iron gallery, the machines room, the forge garden, and more.



Have fun experimenting and trying to solve different scientific challenges. You can also learn all about a unique metal with a special significance for the region – iron. Find out how iron ore is mined and how iron is made, follow the history of iron and steel in Lorraine and discover the innovations it gave rise to.

Thermal: the first and only aquatic and thermal establishment in France located in the heart of a city.





from the École de Nancy Museum, this aqua leisure, health and wellness complex offers a host of activities over three spaces, all supplied with thermal water and open to all:

### **LEISURE AND SPORTS AREA**

Indoor and outdoor pools, water games, climbing wall and more. All the activities at this centre are based around thermal water. It also includes fitness and cardio-training rooms.



The space offers a wide range of activities: saunas, indoor and outdoor pools equipped with hydromassage jets, relaxation and more. The iconic round pool with its mosaic tiles is located within this space, completed with a spa institute.

Treatment of conditions ranging from rheumatology to the after-effects of trauma. To discover the thermal benefits, a rheumatology discovery day has been created with three treatments and relaxation in the thermal spa. Mini-treatments are also offered.

# PARKS AND GARDENS

To recharge your batteries, there's nothing like a green space in the heart of the city! The Greater Nancy authority agrees, and today maintains 300 hectares of green spaces - city parks, gardens, flowerbeds and walkways. These green spaces are less than ten minutes' walk apart, which makes walking round the city a real pleasure. They are also an opportunity to take a break, enjoy leisure activities or just soak up a different atmosphere. No fewer than four parks have been awarded the 'remarkable garden' label. Must-see parks and gardens include:

### PÉPINIÈRE PARK

situated in the heart of the historic centre. Known as 'la Pep' by the locals, it's an oasis of greenery and also features a mini-zoo, mini-golf, play area, several food outlets and a magnificent rose garden, as well as the famous statue by Rodin. It's a paradise for strollers, joggers, children and students, a breath of fresh air for city-dwellers, and an essential stop-off on your visit to Nancy!

In summer, cool down in the new reflecting pool.

### THE WATER GARDENS

designed by celebrated landscape gardener Alexandre Chemetoff. Offering a year-round display of foliage, fountains and unusual pools filled with aquatic plants, this is an ideal spot for a relaxing stroll.



### **CURE D'AIR PARK**

at an altitude of 300 metres. offers a real breath of fresh air and a stunnina panoramic view over Nancy. When it was created, the pure air and sunny position made the park an instant success and it soon became popular, with its children's play areas, restaurant and auinauette.



### SAINTE-MARIE PARK



the second largest park after la Pep, a stone's throw from the "Ecole de Nancy" Museum and the Nancy Thermal spa and aquatic centre. In 1908 it became a private garden and underwent major landscaping. A number of remarkable trees were planted. Later ownership passed to the city, and it became a public garden.

### THE GARDEN OF THE ECOLE DE NANCY MUSEUM

with its distinct turn of the 20th century atmosphere. Inspired by English-style aardens, it features the plants created by horticulturists in Nancy at that time, including peonies, anemones, lilacs and hydrangeas. The garden, which is listed as a historic monument, also contains three monuments.

### THE GARDENS OF THE PALAIS DU GOUVERNEMENT

a tranquil and delightful spot in the heart of the city, characterised by its majestic trees - maples, copper beeches more than 100 years old, and plane trees with a circumference of over 5 metres and which are said to be over 250 years old!





### THE DOMINIQUE-ALEXANDRE GODRON GARDEN



tucked away behind the Aauarium, not far from Place Stanislas, features some remarkable horticultural collections. Founded by Stanislaw in 1758, it was League). Nancy's first botanical aarden.

### SQUARE JULES-DORGET

created in 2009 and named after Émile Gallé's gardener. It is located on the former industrial site of the Constructions Électriques de Nancy, which was converted into a housing complex in the style of the "Ecole de Nancy". The impressive Art nouveau style wrought-iron gate was transferred here from Saurupt Park.

### THE JEAN-MARIE PELT BOTANICAL GARDENS



### THE RICHARD POUILLE GARDEN

This park in the centre of Vandoeuvre-lès-Nancy sprawls out over 16 ha. It is crossed by the Brichambeau stream and classified as an "LPO Refuge" (Bird-Protection

### THE CHATEAU DE FLEVILLE GARDEN



landscaped by Paul de Choulot, provides a romantic areen settina for the Château. The previous 18thcentury aarden had been designed by a disciple of Le Nôtre. Visitors can admire the wide views, winding paths, light-filled clearings and reflecting pool, not foraettina the island with its pretty Art Nouveau bridge.



### **OUR TOP TIP**

A guided tour app combining games, videos and augmented reality offers visitors a choice of four circuits. Discover the Botanical Gardens in a fun an innovative way! Entry to the gardens is free, but you'll need to buy a ticket if you want to visit the greenhouses.

### NATURA 2000

is a European environmental network of marine and terrestrial natural sites characterised by the scarcity or fragility of their wildlife and habitats. Malzéville, located within the Greater Nancy area, is one such site. The plateau offers a breathtaking panoramic view over Greater Nancy and the Meurthe Valley.

### THE GARDENS OF THE CHÂTEAU DE MONTAIGU

A textbook example of garden design and the heritage of Lorraine, offering magnificent views of the Château. Other remarkable features include the centuries-old trees and French gardens with their reflecting pool. A series of sculptures by Jean-François Chevalier, entitled 'Gueules d'enfer', have recently been installed in the gardens. They are a tribute to the metal workers who worked in the former Pompey steelworks.





And don't miss the from 29 September to 1 November 2023, in Place Stanislas.

### **ENVIRONMENTALLY SENSITIVE AREAS**

A number of sites with exceptional landscapes or natural habitats have been designated as 'espaces naturels sensibles' (environmentally sensitive areas) in order to protect them. These sites are open to the public for recreational use and to raise awareness about environmental conservation.

Greater Nancy has six designated environmentally sensitive areas:

- The 'zone pionnière' at Artsur-Meurthe
- The Bosserville valley at Artsur-Meurthe
- The Foulon and Encensoir islands at Tomblaine

- The Malzéville plateau at Agincourt, Eulmont, Dommartemont, Lay-Saint-Christophe, Malzéville and Saint-Max
- The Saint-Geneviève mound at Essey-lès-Nancy
- The Fourasses woods and dry grassland at Villers-lès-Nancy.

# **CYCLING TOURISM**

On foot, by bus - and why not explore Nancy by bike?
Situated at the crossroads of several European cycle routes, Nancy and its region are ideal for cycling. Two major cycle routes pass alongside the canal and the Meurthe River:

- > The Voie Bleue Moselle-to-Saône cycle route, and one of its variants: the Boucle de la Moselle
- > The V52 Paris-to-Prague cycle route

### THE VOIE BLEUE, A PICTURE POSTCARD ROUTE

A national cycle route between the Moselle and the Saône rivers, stretching from the Luxembourg border to Lyon. A 700-kilometre trip. Gentle gradients.

Its plus point: interconnections with other European cycle routes (EuroVelo 5 and EuroVelo 6).

There are also some lovely bike rides along the River Meurthe, to enjoy on your own or with family and friends, just minutes from the city centre.

# **CONTEMPORARY ART - ADN**

### **ADN - ART DANS NANCY (ART IN NANCY)**

In Nancy you can discover works of art while enjoying a stroll around the city. Follow the Street Art trail to discover some thirty works. From the old town (Ville Vieille) to the Place des Vosges, or from Place Simone Veil to Saint Catherine's Gate, art is everywhere, and a feature of daily life for the residents of Nancy.

Follow the itineraries and admire the talent of the local, national and international artists who have left their mark on the city. Their work constitutes an open-air section of the Fine Arts Museum! Since 2015, new works, some temporary, some permanent, including installations, frescoes and exhibitions, have been added to this public collection. In a glorious mix of styles, artists from near and far have responded to the Fine Arts Museum's invitation to give us a different perspective on the city and reveal its artistic DNA.

Among the best-known works are:

### GÉ PELLINI'S THE BULL

a giant bull (3 metres in length and weighing 800 kg) installed in the centre of the city in spring 2018. Echoing the coat of arms of Stanislaw, the red horned animal has become an iconic image of the city.



### GIULIA

the monumental mural by English portrait artist David Walker is one of the largest he has painted in France. Giulia has become



emblematic of Nancy's street

### STAN



created by renowned portrait artist Jef Aérosol in 2016 using stencils and spray paint, on one of the walls of the Dominique-Alexandre Godron Garden. The portrait creates a stunning perspective and opens up a dialogue with Place Stanislas.

### THE BOOK TREE

designed by Studiolada Architects, in the shape of a curved wooden arch, is a double-sided bookshelf where members of the public can deposit and take books.



### **OUR TOP TIP**

a free 'public library', the book tree allows you to cultivate your reading habit, discover new authors or expand your collection. Feel free to donate, exchange, and read!

# **GASTRONOMY**

Like many cities, Nancy has its local specialities, both sweet and savoury, just waiting to be tasted in the region's numerous shops and restaurants. Discovering these specialities is an essential part of your stay, not only for cultural reasons but to give your taste buds a treat! Wander round the markets and up and down the little streets, choose your restaurant and don't hesitate to ask the staff to recommend not-to-be-missed specialities. Leaving Nancy without having tasted a macaron or a Stan Baba would be unimaginable!

### NANCY PASSIONS SUCRÉES

Nancy Passions Sucrées is a brand created in 2018, bringing together under one umbrella the artisans and manufacturers who preserve and enhance Nancy's traditional sweet specialities.

In the summer of 2019, after a first session, the label was attributed to nine pastry chefs, confectioners and restaurateurs for more than 20 specialities.



### Why does the ducal city have so many sweet specialities?

Perhaps because the former king of Poland, Nancy's very own Stanislaw, had a bit of a sweet tooth!

Thanks to him the region inherited among other things the baba au Tokaji de Hongrie (which would become the rum baba in the 19th century) and madeleine cakes.

At the time of the French Revolution, two Benedictine nuns popularised Nancy macarons. The original recipe of the 'Sœurs Macarons' (Macaron Sisters) is still a carefully guarded secret.

At the beginning of the 19th century, a confectioner invented a boiled sweet scented with essence of bergamot. The Nancy bergamot received protected geographical indication in 1996.

As for the Saint-Epvre cake, it dates back to the end of the 19th century, like the Basilica from which it takes its name. It's still made in the same neighbourhood.

And in the 20th century, innovative confectioners have created duchesses, marquises, florentines, craquelines and perles de Lorraine- all patented - and many other specialities.

### SPOTLIGHT ON THE MIRABELLE

Lorraine is the only region in the world to produce quantities, and of a high quality, of the famous mirabelle plum, used in many recipes - jam, fruit cordial, liqueur and a favourite with restaurateurs as the star ingredient in numerous desserts. Not to mention some of the new sweet treats born out of our local talent!

### Beer and Lorraine - they ao back a long way!


A century ago, there were already more than 350 breweries in the region.

In the late 1980s, the concept of craft beers, that had emerged in the UK and the US some years previously, arrived in France. Today, more than 1,600 craft beers are brewed in France, 70 in Lorraine.

### When brewing and art go hand in hand

In the late 19th and early 20th centuries, Lorraine experienced a period of intense intellectual, industrial and artistic activity. This was the context in which the "Ecole de Nancy" emerged, an art movement that had an impact on all sectors of activity, not least brewing. Several important sites bear witness to this golden age:

- > The Palais de la bière, built by Pierre Le Bourgeois in 1926
- > The famous Brasserie Excelsior opened in 1911 by the Moreau brothers. brewers at Vézelise
- > The Saint-Nicolas-de-Port brewery, an iconic example of Art Deco industrial architecture, built in 1931 and converted into the French Brewery Museum



### The Lorraine Beer Route

The Lorraine Beer Route was launched in 2019 by DESTINATION NANCY in partnership with the French Brewery Museum. The project aimed to identify remarkable sites in the region with links to the brewery sector and brewing activities, including museums, breweries, former breweries, malt factories and statues.

Today the Lorraine Beer Route comprises four museums, 19 remarkable sites and more than 100 breweries and craft breweries between northern and southern Lorraine including 6 in The Greater Nancy.

Every year, DESTINATION NANCY and the French Brewery Museum organise an event all about beer in two stages:

> A Brewers' Trade Fair, the leading technical trade fair in France for professional and amateur brewers (20 and 21 October 2023)

> A Beer Festival with an evening party on 21 October and a Beer & Flavours Market on 22 October 2023.

# **CULTURAL LIFE**

The cradle of Art Nouveau, Nancy has a rich history and impressive cultural heritage. With its 7 museums, 7 theatres and 1 opera, some 30 libraries, as well as numerous cultural venues including the Zénith in Maxéville, L'Autre Canal and the Octroi arts centre, the city is well placed to offer a comprehensive and varied programme of cultural events.

### **CULTURAL VENUES**

Numerous establishments throughout the Greater Nancy area contribute to the destination's vibrant cultural life. These include the Lorraine Ballet and Choreographical Centre, the André Malraux arts centre (Vandœuvre-lès-Nancy), the arts and community centre in Seichamps, the Espace Jean-Jaurès (Tomblaine), L'Autre Canal, the LEM puppet theatre, the Lorraine National Opera, the Espace Chaudeau (Ludres), the Salle Poirel, the Theâtre de la Manufacture, the théâtre de la Roële (Villers-lès-Nancy), the théâtre de Mon Désert, the Zénith in Maxéville and the Octoi arts centre.

### THE LORRAINE NATIONAL OPERA

### NANCY CITIPASS

Situated on Place Stanislas, the Lorraine National Opera, whose design was inspired by the sumptuous Palais Garnier in Paris, is one of France's five national operas located in the regions. The national opera distinction recognises the artistic work and skills of the teams who each year put together a rich and varied programme of operas, recitals and concerts.

### THE THEATRE DE LA MANUFACTURE

As well as programming contemporary and classical theatre productions, the National Centre for Drama also supports the creation of new works.

### THE SALLE POIREL

The Salle Poirel is one of Nancy's historical and architectural gems, the facade of which was redesigned by Robert Stadler in 2013. Each season the vibrant and eclectic programme includes

popular, jazz and classical music concerts as well as stand-up comedian shows, aet-togethers and numerous other events.

### L'AUTRE CANAL

A live music venue dedicated to promoting rock, jazz, rap, electronic and other modern musical aenres through a varied programme of concerts. It encourages emerging talents and supports the development of the music sector.

### THE OCTROI ARTS CENTRE

The Octroi Nancy is a vibrant and innovative arts centre, situated on the site of the former slauahterhouses. A venue in constant evolution, buzzing with creativity, it challenges the established order and brings together artists from different disciplines to invent, test out and write the future.

### KEY EVENTS

A number of important annual cultural events are organised in Nancy.



### VIDEO MAPPING IN PLACE STANISLAS

The city is rightly proud of its UNESCO-listed Place Stanislas, and each summer proposes a spectacular sound and light show with projection mapping on the monuments. A stunning visual experience.

The Industrial Revolution completely transformed Nancy and the Lorraine region. Major industries are still based here, including the shoe company André, which originated in Nancy, as did Alstom manufacturing, and the Pompey steelworks, whose blast furnaces provided 7,300 tonnes of wrought iron for the construction of the Eiffel Tower. Also, of course, the iconic Daum crystal glassworks, emblematic of the Art Nouveau movement. No fewer than 25 sites and establishments representative of the area's industrial heritage have been listed and are well worth discovering.

The following are the main and most emblematic industrial heritage sites; the remaining ones are to be found in the different parts of the city:

### LA MANUFACTURE DES TABACS (FORMER TOBACCO FACTORY)

closed in 1981 and converted into a major arts centre, preserving the single chimney.

### THE FORMER SLAUGHTERHOUSE

now the Renaissance technology hub, inaugurated in 2013.

### LE FÉRU DES SCIENCES

### THE LA CRAFFE WINE CELLAR AND MAXÉVILLE BREWERIES

which produced highly renowned beer.

# ARTS AND CRAFTS

Arts and craft professions are fascinating because of their authenticity, diversity and timeless nature. They constitute a heritage passed down through the years, even centuries. Nancy showcases remarkable expertise, recognised by the general public. Nancy is a member of the Ville et Métiers d'Art (VMA) network, of which it was the first city to be awarded the label.

For several years now, the Nancy city council has promoted arts and craft professions, and plays an active role in the arts and crafts trade fair organised each year at the Congress centre in Vandœuvre-lès-Nancy (Salon Habitat Déco, Métiers d'Art et Antiquaires).



The arts and crafts tradition lives on in Nancy and the surrounding area through some of the best-known glass and crystal manufacturers includina:

### THE LEGENDARY

### DAUM CRYSTAL GLASSWORKS

established in 1878, famous the world over for breathing a new life of crystal and colour into the works of great artists.

### BACCARAT

the symbol of French luxury, world-famous manufacturer of fine crystal, located in Baccarat. The company has several outlets and a crystal alass museum in the region.

### THE LUNÉVILLE FAIENCE FACTORY

one of the last major manufacturers in Lorraine, is remarkable for its

history and the way it has adapted to each era. The Lunéville factory is closely associated with that of St-Clément and absorbed that of Sarreauemines in 1978. It now produces the collections of all three faience manufacturers.

### THE ÉMAUX DE LONGWY

a faience manufacturer founded in Longwy in 1798 in a former convent. The faience production is especially well known for the tableware commissioned by Napoleon for the Imperial Homes of the Legion d'Honneur.




## NANCY CITIPASS




### \* SPOTLIGHT ON THE LORRAINE MUSEUM

During the renovation work and while the permanent collections are closed, the Palace of the Dukes of Lorraine presents a temporary exhibition illustrating the history of the duchies of Lorraine and Bar, housed in the Franciscan Church. The Church was built in the late 15th century after René, Duke of Lorraine, had defeated Charles the Bold, Duke of Burgundy. It became the necropolis of the House of Lorraine and an important symbol of the dukes' power. The many paintings, sculptures, stained glass and objets d'art on display in Nancy's oldest church retrace five centuries of the history of Lorraine. The exhibition also features a model of the city in 1611, unveiled on this occasion, and projection mapping that immerses visitors in the heart of the capital of the Dukes of Lorraine.

### The ducal chapel

Adjacent to the north side of the church is the "Round Chapel". Built during the reign of Duke Henry II between 1609 and 1612, its restoration was one of the first steps in the museum's renovation project. It still houses the tombs of the princes of the ducal family of Lorraine.




\* FOCUS ON THE FORMER MAGASINS REUNIS

Antoine Corbin opened his first shop, the "Bazar Saint-Nicolas" in 1867, at the foot of Rue Saint-Dizier, with a prophetic motto: "Sell a lot, to sell cheap. Sell cheap, to sell a lot". Success led the founder to move his business closer to the train station in 1881. In 1899, this business was shared by his two sons, Louis and Eugène Corbin, a great patron of the École de Nancy, as well as his two sons-in-law. Between 1905 and 1910, the Magasins Réunis would welcome in new constructions in the Art Nouveau style. However, they would later suffer heavily under the bombing of the city, and in 1916, a fire caused by German shelling destroyed all its buildings.

These were reconstructed between 1926 and 1928 upon the plans of architect Le Bourgeois in an Art Déco style, calling on a few well-known artists (the ramps and railings of the main staircase would be crafted by Jean Prouvé, still visible today).

For many years, the Magasins Réunis was the largest shop in the province, before becoming Printemps in 1983.

### SPOTLIGHT ON NOTRE-DAME DE BONSECOURS

A masterpiece of Baroque art, designed by Emmanuel Héré in the 18th century, Nancy's Notre-Dame de Bonsecours is best known as the place where Stanislaw and his wife are buried. The heart of their daughter, Marie Leszczynska, Oueen of France, is also entombed here. The church was built on the site of a former chapel, where the Burgundians killed in the Battle of Nancy in 1477 were buried.


### SPOTLIGHT ON THE DAUM CRYSTAL GLASSWORKS

Between 1872 and 1900 the city's population grew from 45,000 to more than 100,000. A new town was built to the west of the railway. Prestiaious apartment buildings or private villas such as the magnificent, recently restored Villa Majorelle. The Nancy Thermal (spa) district was born in the early 20th century and was developed in preparation for the International Exhibition of Eastern France, held in 1909. The city takes on a countrified air here, its streets lined with family homes and small gardens.




ARTEM is a university campus with a spirit stemming directly from that of the École de Nancy, whose members hoped to break down the barriers between disciplines in order to place them in dialogue. This campus, included among the 12 French campuses of excellence, brings together future creators, engineers and managers studying at the Mining School, the National Higher School of Art and Design of Nancy and the ICN Business School. Constructed between 2003 and 2017, the site is also an

example of the successful reconversion of a former military wasteland, under the direction of architect Nicolas Michelin.

The 700 m gallery of multicoloured glass symbolically links all the spaces and marks the landscape of this district with its renewed identity.

The Jean Lamour Institute, one of the most influential European laboratories in material sciences, can also be found on this campus dedicated to creativity and innovation.



Architects Émile André and Henry Gutton were commissioned to build the planned private residential planned private residential area in the south of the city in 1901. Only six villas were built, but all are exceptional. The other buildings were built between 1920 and 1930 in a pure Art Deco style.

Saurupt Park was designed and built as a private residential area, which is why the estate included a caretaker's lodge. One of the gates that enclosed this private Art nouveau residential area can be seen at Square Jules Dorget (see map on page 32).

# 1/ WALKS AND HIKES

The city is home to 21 signposted trails developed alongside the French Hiking Federation, forming loops of 6 to 14 km to cross on foot, bike or even horseback. Other themed circuits complete this offering. These can all be found on the Balades54 and Cirkwi apps. Here are a few examples.

### IN THE STEPS OF THE MAXÉVILLE QUARRY WORKERS (5KM)

Follow the 'Sentier des Carrières' and discover a part of our region's history recounted on information panels featuring text and images.

### THE SEVEN CASTLES'S WALK AT VILLERS-LÈS-NANCY

An app-quided walk on which you can find out more about the history of Villers-lès-Nancy by scanning the QR codes on the different buildings, including the Brabois and Graffigny châteaux.



### WALK BETWEEN THE MEURTHE RIVER AND THE CANAL AT MAXÉVILLE

Winding along the paths and beside the waterways, this is a lovely and varied walk that will delight all the family. Information panels, designed by the pupils of Pixérécourt school in Malzéville, describe the biodiversity of this area.

### THE SMALL (10.5KM) AND LARGE (18KM) LOOPS ON THE MALZÉVILLE PLATEAU

This Natura 2000 site, also designated an environmentally sensitive area, offers two great walks for nature lovers. Both offer an opportunity to appreciate the wealth of biodiversity of the chalk grassland and the forest that partly covers the plateau.



### THE LA CASTINE-LUDRES WALK

This trail, steeped in the site's atmosphere of hidden secrets, takes you across the hillsides of Ludres and to the Haye plateau. Along the way, discover the former limestone quarry of La Castine. Enjoy a delightful walk with friends or family.





### THE GARDEN WITH 1000 FLOWERS LOOP, VOIRIN GARDEN - LAXOU (2.4KM)

A walk in and around the village, alongside gardens, allotments and little stone walls, that illustrates the succession of varied urban and country landscapes, and the special character of Laxou.

### CIRCULAR WALK AROUND LAXOU (4.8KM)

A long walk to discover the multifaceted landscapes in and around Laxou, including the Haye forest, the hillsides leading to the village, and its allotments.



### THE ENRICHARDS - VANDOEUVRE DISCOVERY TRAIL (1.6KM)

The Enrichards discovery trail is a circular walk over an area formerly covered by the Arrichart vineyard, which will surprise you by its rich biodiversity.






# 2/ TO THE WESTERN HILLS

### MAXÉVILLE

Maxéville was an important fief during the Middle Ages, but it began to grow in the 19th century with the arrival of industrialisation and the creation of the famous Maxéville breweries. On the site of the former Solvay Quarries "the quarry path" offers a 5 km walk with information panels evoking this industrial past and the lives of its workers.



This was also the location chosen for the Zénith arena, the first facility of its kind in Europe to offer a reversible open-air stage. The enormous former Maxéville brewery is another major location in the town. Also worth seeing in Maxéville are the Jean Lamour stairs at the Château Bas (town hall), the Virgin and Child (Gothic statue from 1347) and the tapestries in Saint-Martin's church. If you enjoy walking, head along the Chemin Stratégique from Chêne du Bon Dieu Forest to Champigneulles Forest

### LAXOU

Old Laxou is a picture postcard village with its cobbled streets. The town hall, which is from the beginning of the 20th century, is remarkable. Heading further down towards Nancy, look out for the Art nouveau and Art déco mansions. In the lower part of Laxou, you will find the Provinces district, typical of the 1960s, and Espace Europe, a cultural centre housed in the deconsecrated Saint-Paul's church and listed as a 20th-century architectural heritage site.



Laxou has laid out and signposted more than 12km of paths through gardens, orchards and the forest. For a six-month periods every two years, artists are invited to exhibit their work in the open air, creating a very popular event that brings nature and culture together.

### VILLERS-LÈS-NANCY

Villers-les-Nancy was originally a wine-growing village and the fief of the local seigniors. It is known as the town with the seven châteaux. Panels with QR codes allow you to discover it. Its patron saint is Saint-Fiacre, the patron saint of gardeners, and one of the main things to see in the town is the outstanding Jean-Marie Pelt Botanical Garden.

Other sites of interest include: the ruins of the Cistercian Clairlieu Abbey founded in 1159 - all that remains are a few stones and a panel explaining the history on the road to Villers Clairlieu; Remicourt Château; Domaine de l'Asnée and its château built in the 16th century and altered in the 19th century, which belongs to the diocese and is used for meetings and conferences. Madame de Graffigny Château, an 18th century mansion, stands in the centre of the old village. The local council owns it, and uses it for functions and exhibitions. Inside is an excellent example of an "Ecole de Nancy" fireplace. In the garden are two Lebanon cedars.

While you are in Villers, make sure you also visit the 55-hectare Brabois Château grounds, and take in the breathtaking view from the esplanade.



### VANDŒUVRE-LÈS-NANCY

Vandoeuvre is the second largest town in the Meurthe-et-Moselle department. It ballooned rapidly during the 1960s to meet soaring demand for housing, creating a very successful intercultural melting pot. Together with the 150-stall market, the André Malraux Cultural Centre with its national-level theatre and the 'Musique Action' festival make for a lively cultural scene.

In the old village, very pretty wine-makers' houses (16th to 18th centuries) cling to the slopes around Saint-Melaine's church (15th and 16th century).

Climb higher up for amazing views stretching to the Grand Couronné in the north-east, and the surroundings of Saint-Nicolas de Port and the Middle Vosges in the south.

Nancy Brabois Race Course has one of the best tracks in Eastern France (trotting, flat racing and hurdles) and hosts 14 meetings each year.

The Charmois estate consists of a threehectare wooded park which is open to the public, and a château built in the 18th century which hosts seminars, exhibitions and functions.

### HOUDEMONT

With its traditional winemakers' houses, this very pretty linear village in the foothills of the plateau south-west of Nancy is charming. The network of streets in the centre of Houdemont is set around a covered lavoir (wash house). Did you know that Jacques Callot, Nancy's famous 17th-century engraver, lived here? His house, dating from 1580, bears a plaque. From Montauban at the top of the village, there are fantastic views across Greater Nancy and the whole of the Meurthe valley. Seek out the ancient paths between the houses of the old village and walk to the lake, then follow the Fonteno stream

to its source to enjoy some lovely walks on the hillside above the city. The regional daily newspaper Est Républicain is both headquartered and printed here.

### LUDRES

The Ludres industrial park, known as 'Dynapôle', is home to 350 businesses employing 8,000 people. This makes it Lorraine's largest industrial site by number of businesses. During their leisure time, people flock from all over Greater Nancy to the recent concert hall and large cinema complex at Espace Chandeau. But in the 5th century BC, Ludres was the site of Eastern France's largest Leuci stronghold. In the old part of the village, Saint-Epvre's



church (16th to 18th century) contains the Ludre family vault, and the 13,500 sqm Saint-Thèrese Park can be accessed at any time. There are numerous paths within the village, in particular on the Ludres plateau in the southern part of Haye Forest, where you will have a chance of spotting some of the numerous birds and large fauna that live there (hares, foxes, roe deer and wild boar). Visitors can learn all about the town's vibrant history from the discovery trail and 20 information panels with QR codes.

# 3/ TO THE EASTERN HILLS



### MALZÉVILLE

Pretty houses with their typical wine cellar trap doors are a reminder of Malzéville's wine-growing past. Within the town, a few gems are worth hunting out: the late-19th-century La Douëra (Arabic for small house) is a little palace straight out of One Thousand and One Nights (tours available by appointment). The grounds of La Cure d'Air, a fashionable brasserie from 1902 (now a listed historic monument), offer fabulous views over Nancy and the Meurthe valley. Another green space worth visiting is Abiétinée Park, a 1.5-hectare "Ecole de Nancy" arboretum. Also not to be missed are the Renaissance bridge, and Saint-Martin's church with its notable wall paintings.

Every year, in early April, the ewes from Pixerécourt farm (another place worth a visit!) are moved to their summer grazing grounds on the Mazéville plateau (a Natura 2000 site). Everyone is welcome to follow the shepherd and his dogs for a pleasant 4km walk!

### DOMMARTEMONT

Dommartemont is a pretty little village with cobbled streets, a lavoir (wash house) with a bench, known as the 'Fontaine des Ormes', a number of Art nouveau houses and Saint-Martin's church. A sunny spot with excellent views over Nancy, the village is a sought-after place to live. There are some great walks starting from the plateau (try



the Chemin Stratégique). Fun fact: in 2003, the council replanted 3,000 sqm of 'cultural vineyards' which produce between 1000 and 1200 bottles of wine per year. The wine is available only to people living in the village and in its twin town in Germany.

### ESSEY-LÈS-NANCY

To the east of Nancy, countryside meets city at Essey-lès-Nancy, where large commercial zones have been built, with 250 businesses employing 2,000 people. Both Essey-lès-Nancy and Dommartement lie on SainteGeneviève hill. This former Celtic oppidum offers fabulous views of the Meurthe valley below. Saint-George's Church, built between the 13th and 15th centuries, has an 18th-century marble altar and a painting by Demange Prot dated 1672. The apple conservation orchard, with its rare and heritage varieties, is a must for anyone with an interest in apples - or just food in general! Don't miss the Chemin Stratégique which leads up to the plateau. The 'Essey Chantant' music festival is organised in Essey-lès-Nancy each year.



# 4/ BETWEEN THE MEURTHE, THE CANAL AND THE VALLEY

### SAINT-MAX

As you enter Nancy along the banks of the Meurthe River, you will see the Napoleon III Pont de la Meurthe Château (also known as the Garnier Château).

Did you know that little Saint-Médard's church is the oldest building in Greater Nancy (together with the Commanderie Tower in the city centre)? The church features a Romanesque tower, a 12th-century column capital and a baroque-style altar. And don't miss the pretty statue of the Virgin and Child on the facade.



The Cristalleries (Daum) district dates from the same time as the "Ecole de Nancy". The paths along the 'areen branch' of the Meurthe are very pleasant, taking you in and out of Nancy and Saint-Max.

As you walk, you will come across various interesting buildings such as Gueule-du-Loup chapel, in the hills above Saint-Max. Look for the wolf's head mounted in front of the cross!

### TOMBLAINE

With its islands, lakes and bridges, Tomblaine has always been the ideal venue for all water-related activities.

The aquatic areas and wetlands are also of significant interest in terms of their flora and fauna. Walking along the bird path during the different seasons, you can see moorhens, falcons and grey herons. The vast Méchelle Lake which straddles the border between Nancy and Tomblaine offers walks, trails and a nautical centre where you can enjoy numerous water sports including rowing and canoeing.

In old Tomblaine village, look out for Saint-Pierre's church with its Romanesque tower and attractive 18th-century gate. The



Department of Waterways and Public Works laboratory and the fire station were designed by Jean Prouvé in 1970 and 1973. Make sure you don't miss the Marcel Picot football stadium where the AS Nancy Lorraine team plays, and the Lido swimming pool. Tomblaine also boasts an important annual cultural event, the 'Aux Actes Citoyens' popular theatre festival

### JARVILLE-LA-MALGRANGE

Jarville-la-Malgrange on the Lunéville road was a favourite holiday destination for the dukes, and later for royalty. It is linked to Nancy by a tree-lined avenue. However, more recent history - the industrialisation of the late 19th and early 20th centuries - had the most visible impact on the town. This made Jarville a natural choice of venue for the Féru des sciences (Sciences museum cf. p.museums). Montaigu Château, set further into the park of the same name, is part of the neighbouring village of Laneuveville-

In Renémont wood, you will find the Fonteno stream, which runs down from the Brabois Plateau via Houdemont to Embanie Park in Heillecourt. This completely natural, unspoilt environment offers the ideal conditions for biodiversity to thrive.

Jarville opens out onto the Meurthe Plains to the south-east, towards Art-sur-Meurthe. The imposing silhouette of the 17th-century Charterhouse is easy to spot.





### LANEUVEVILLE-DEVANT-NANCY

The Cités de La Madeleine, designed by architect Emile André, are an impressive example of early-20th-century workers' housing. This is where the connecting canal joins the Marne-Rhine Canal. You can follow the cycle routes among the towpath, south to Fléville or north to Jarville and Nancy marina (Port Saint-Georges). Admire the Madeleine

canal aqueduct, where the Marne-Rhine canal flows across the Meurthe River. And don't miss the lock-keeper's house. Montaigu Château, and most of its grounds, lie within the boundaries of Laneuvevilledevant-Nancy. Enthusiasts will pick out an oak tree more than 150 years old, and two black walnut trees.

Unusual feature: water rising up through the veins of salt in the ground has created ponds in which you can spot coastal plants! Most of them have grown from seeds brought by migratory birds. Halophytes are very much at home here!

### ART-SUR-MEURTHE

In Art-sur-Meurthe, you really feel like you're in the country. The stunning 17th-century Bosserville Charterhouse, or Carthusian Monastery, is 110 metres long (the same length as Place Stanislas). The charterhouse is now home to a vocational training establishment.It is open for visits during France's annual Heritage Days. Events are held at the 18th-century château. In the centre of the village, look for a statue of Ioan of Arc in a suit of armour standing in a small niche. It marks the house where Ioan's father is believed to have lived. Saint-Phlin mountain offers fabulous views over the Meurthe Valley and Saint-Nicolas de Port basilica.




### HEILLECOURT

Old Heillecourt is a linear village with restored houses and a small cobbled centre. It is typical of Lorraine, and features the traditional 'usoir': a sort of yard between the houses and the road. Heillecourt has grown considerably in recent years, with developments of modern houses and several large commercial zones set around Embanie Park with its 35 hectares of leisure facilities and green spaces for walking. With

its five industrial parks, Heillecourt plays an important role in the local economy. Each spring, the village comes to life for 'Saveurs Nature', when artisan food producers gather to sell their high-quality wares. It's a great opportunity to taste some delicious foods and do your bit for the planet!

### FLÉVILLE-DEVANT-NANCY

Many modern houses have been built in the village, but the centre retains its rural cachet. Fléville Château, a beautiful blend of Medieval and Renaissance styles, is one of the architectural highlights of Greater Nancy. In season, make sure you include the château and listed grounds in your itinerary. Enjoy walking? A large number of paths start from Fléville-devant-Nancy, mainly heading southwards and towards the Vosges Massif. In the village alone, there are nine lock-keepers' cottages: the connecting canal between the Marne-Rhine Canal and the East Canal is beautiful and some very attractive paths have been created along it for walking and cycling.



# 5/ TO THE EAST

### SEICHAMPS

Seichamps is a pleasant village opening onto fields east of Nancy. It has several 15th-century houses, large farms and a riding centre. In the 13th-century church are some beautiful old pews.

The Cheese Fair, held in Seichamps on the third Sunday in September each year, is attended by over 40,000 people! Jardin Roussel will be of interest to heritage fruit enthusiasts. It is an orchard of 200 fruit trees designed and created from former family orchards, where ancient varieties of apple are conserved. Come along and learn all about local fruit trees. Workshops are organised each year, on pruning in February and on grafting in March.

### PULNOY

Pulnoy, meaning 'foal farm', lies in the east of Greater Nancy. Its modern houses are surrounded by fields, grasslands and forests. The town is best known for its eighteenhole golf centre (and training school) which has become the main feature of this part of Greater Nancy. It offers 75 hectares of landscaped courses and is less than a quarter of an hour from the city centre.



Pulnoy also boasts the 8,000 sqm Masserine Lake nature reserve, which lies within a two-hectare green space. Signposted trails that extend into the neighbouring forest are the perfect way to keep fit, discover the local flora and fauna, or both!

In November, don't miss the truffle festival, which is popular with amateurs, specialists and researchers alike. The event grows bigger every year, with scientific meetings organised alongside the festival itself.

### SAULXURES-LÈS-NANCY

Saulxures-lès-Nancy is surrounded by woods. The town is a successful mix of a traditional Lorraine village and its surrounding farms, and developments of modern houses and business zones.



The Parc des Etangs, a wetland paradise, stretches across 13 hectares of wetland meadows, lakes, streams and drainage ditches. It is home to some specific plants (white water lilies and water crow-foot), flowered meadows (with three notable species of orchid) and a multitude of small marshland animals. It is also an ornithological reserve. Facilities have been built for a wide range of sports. The park is open all year round.

18th-century De Rutant Château is privately owned. However, it can be visited during the Heritage Days or hired for weddings and other events (it hosts some major fairs). The little road through the fields between Saulxures and Art-sur-Meurthe offers excellent views of Bosserville Charterhouse, from a perspective that shows off all the building's beauty and its impressive size.





### INFORMATION ABOUT TOURISM LABELS AND AWARDS

DESTINATION NANCY - Metropolitan Tourist Office is certified ISO 20121, classified category 1 and recognised by the "Qualité Tourisme", "Tourisme et Handicap" accessible-tourism and "Accueil Vélo" cycle-friendly labels. ### CATEGORY 1 CLASSIFICATION
